Quick Guide to Topical Steroid Use

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The following table is intended to provide physicians with a few common topical steroids that are used for a variety of dermatologic conditions, based on body location. These steroids can be used safely for 2 weeks without significant risk of cutaneous or systemic side effects.

Of note:

- Ointments: oil-based and preservative free, provide an occlusive barrier which prevents moisture loss, allowing the greatest benefit, especially well-suited to dry, cracked skin
- Creams: non-greasy, disappear when rubbed in, more cosmetically appealing than ointments, often preferred by patients for use on face or under clothes, often contain preservatives and alcohol which may burn cracked skin
- Lotions: similar to creams, but less thick, quick absorption

Diaper area Apply to affected area BID	Low	Hydrocortisone 1% cr with clotrimazole 1% Desonide 0.05% cr (<i>Desocort</i>) with clotrimazole 1% Note: clotrimazole prevents candida infections which are common in genital/diaper area	Any size format, compounded by pharmacy **

^{*} Mometasone 0.1% cream/ointment (Elocom) should only be applied once per day

- Mix equal volumes of hydrocortisone 1% and clotrimazole 1%; or
- Mix equal volumes of desonide 0.05% and clotrimazole 1%
