What Is a Blood Test?


A blood test helps your doctor learn more about your body.

This will help them check how your body is working and make sure you are staying healthy.




Where Does the Adventure Begin?

When you arrive, you will go to the Pediatric Test Centre on the 2nd floor of the Montreal Children's Hospital.





Take a Seat in the Waiting Room



Next, you will take a number at the entrance, and once it is called, you will register at the front desk.

Now, you will wait in the waiting room until it is your turn to do the blood test.





Your Visit to the Procedure Room



When it is your turn, a nurse will call you into one of the rooms.

You can decide if you want to do your blood test sitting up on the chair, or sitting/laying on the bed.



First, the nurse will put a blue elastic around your arm.
This is called a tourniquet.

It will give your arm a little squeeze and helps the nurse see your veins better.



The nurse will gently touch your arm to find a vein.








Then, the nurse will wipe your skin with an alcohol swab, to make sure it is very clean.



Next, there will be a quick poke to get blood from your vein.

You can ask the nurse to count to 3 before the poke. Some children and youth say the poke feels like a pinch.



You Are All Done!

Finally, once the blood test is complete, the nurse will put a small bandaid on your arm. You are all done!



Blood Test Facts Sheet

Why do I need a blood test?

A blood test helps your doctor see how your body is working.

What does the nurse do with my blood? It goes in a small tube called a vial.



Where does my blood go once the blood test is done?

The vial goes in a bigger tube, through a special tunnel that brings it straight to a place called a lab, where they will get the information the doctor needs from your blood.

What is my job during the blood test? Your most important job is to stay as still as possible.



Coping Strategies

Coping strategies are ways we can help ourselves feel better when we're doing something that is hard. They can also help distract us, or change our focus onto something more positive.

Just like we need tools to build things or solve puzzles, we have tools inside us that we can use to handle tough situations and feelings.



Coping Strategies Ideas

Take slow deep breaths - in & out - while remembering to keep your body very still!





Use a **fidget**, or another toy that helps you relax. You can also hug your favorite stuffed animal!

You can watch something on a phone or tablet, or listen to your favorite music!





Think about your favorite place to be.

What do you see? Hear? Touch? Taste? Smell?
